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1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 The Draft Site Allocations Submission Development Plan Document has been prepared in accordance with the relevant legislation of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (as amended) and Regulations as set out in the Town and Country Planning (Local Development)(England) Regulations 2012. Self-assessments on how legal requirements and soundness have been met are published as part of the submission documents to the Secretary of State. A Consultation Statement setting out in detail how the requirements of Regulation 22 has been met has also been published, and both documents are available on the Council's website.
- 1.2. This statement summarises how Regulation 17(d) of the 2012 Regulations has been met. The provisions of Regulation 17(d) are reiterated in Regulation 22 of the Regulations. In this regard this statement covers both regulations. The statement's structure follows the sequence of Regulation 17(d)(i) to (iv) as shown below. The appendices follow the same sequence (except in the case of iii. and iv) and provide comprehensive detail demonstrating how the requirements of Regulation 17 have been met:

i. Regulation 17(d)(i) Bodies and persons invited to make representations under regulation 18 - Appendix 1;

ii. Regulation 17(d)(ii) How those bodies and persons were invited to make such representations - Appendix 2;

iii. Regulation 17(d)(iii) A summary of the main issues raised in the representations made to Regulation 18 - Appendix 3;

iv. Regulation 17(d)(iv) How those main issues have been addressed in the DPD – also Appendix 3.

2.0 Summary of the Regulation 18 stage of the Site Allocations DPD

- 2.1 Two main stages of consultation on the Site Allocations DPD were undertaken to meet the requirements of Regulation 18. The two stages were:
 - initial notification of the intention to produce the document, which was sent out on 31 May 2012. This letter let the relevant bodies know of the Council's intention to prepare the Site Allocations DPD, as part of a suite of Development Delivery DPDs. These bodies were invited to make representations on the content and issues that they would like the DPD to contain, with reference to the purpose of the DPD (as set out in the letter);
 - ii. consultation on the Draft DPD from 18 June and 31 July 2015.
- 2.2 A further consultation was undertaken on Land to the east of Martyrs Lane in January to March 2017, following a Council resolution in October 2016 to undertake a bespoke public consultation exercise in respect of the possibility of substituting the six safeguarded sites in the draft Site Allocations DPD with land to the east of Martyrs Lane to meet future development

needs between 2027-2040¹. The details of how this consultation met the requirements of Regulation 17 is also included in this statement.

3. Regulation 17(d) a statement setting out -

(i) which bodies and persons invited to make representations under regulation 18

3.1 Table 1 sets out the specific and general consultation bodies, as defined in the Regulations, that Woking Borough Council invited to make representations under Regulation 18. A full list can be found in Appendix 1.

(ii) how those bodies and persons were invited to make such representations (under regulation 18)

Initial notification

- 3.2 On 31 May 2012 the Council wrote to the specific consultation bodies listed in Table 1 to notify them of the Council's intention to prepare the Site Allocations DPD, as part of a suite of Local Development Documents (LDDs). These bodies were invited to make representations on the content and issues that they would like the DPD to contain, with reference to the specific purpose and scope of the DPD. This was to allocate specific sites for the delivery of all forms of development, including residential, commercial and retail development and where relevant, safeguard land for the delivery of infrastructure. The text of this letter can be found in Appendix 2a.
- 3.3 The letter highlighted the programme for the preparation of this DPD, as set out in the Council's adopted Local Development Scheme (LDS). It also referred to the timeframes for the independent examination of the Core Strategy and advised that any representations should be consistent with the policies set out in the Core Strategy. The Core Strategy was subsequently found sound at examination and was adopted by the Council in October 2012.
- 3.4 A further letter was sent on 13 February 2013 to neighbouring boroughs, to inform them of a number of planning documents that the Council intended to produce that may potentially create cross boundary issues. This letter offered the boroughs the opportunity to comment on matters that should be taken into consideration. The text of this letter can be found in Appendix 2a. This links to the Council's Duty to Cooperate, and the emphasis in national policy on the importance of effective and on-going joint working between strategic policy-making authorities, as integral to the production of a positively prepared and justified Local Plan. The requirements of the Duty to Cooperate Statement.
- 3.5 Further information on this initial stage of consultation on the Site Allocations DPD can be found in Section 3 of the Consultation Statement.

Draft Site Allocations DPD

- 3.6 On 18 June 2015 the Council sent letters and emails to the specific and general consultation bodies listed in Table 1, notifying them of the consultation on the Draft DPD taking place in the period from 18 June to 31 July 2015. The text of the letter can be found in Appendix 2b.
- 3.7 Approximately 2,300 organisations and individuals, whose details were stored on the Council's LDF Consultation Database, were also notified about this stage of consultation (see Appendix 1).

The letter and email notification contained a link to where the Draft DPD and accompanying documents were available on the Council's LDF website. Paper copies of the DPD were sent to specific consultation bodies.

- 3.8 The letters and emails outlined that the Council was consulting on the specific deliverable allocated sites to enable delivery of the development objectives and requirements of the Core Strategy (2012). These bodies were asked to give their views on the proposed draft Site Allocations.
- 3.9 The letters and emails informed the bodies and persons that the documents were available to view or download on the Council's website, that paper copies were available to view in the four libraries across the Borough and at the Civic Offices reception. The opening times of the libraries and Civic Offices were also included.
- 3.10 The Council publicised the consultation as widely as possible, through a variety of means. This included posters and leaflets distributed and displayed in various locations around the Borough. The consultation was also publicised with an article in Woking magazine, which is distributed to every household in the Borough, on local radio stations (Eagle radio and BBC Radio Surrey), through social media (Twitter and Facebook) and with a number of public events in Woking town centre, in local centres, at Party in the Park (the Borough's annual fair/festival held in Woking Park). Specific meetings were also arranged with Residents Associations and Neighbourhood Forums, and with established business organisations, including Woking Chamber of Commerce and the Council's Developer and Agents Forum. Further meetings were also carried out with businesses, community groups (e.g young people) and others where requested. Further detail of the extensive consultation methods used can be found in Section 3 and the appendices of the Consultation Statement.
- 3.11 A questionnaire was produced, to accompany the Draft DPD, which was available online with an accompanying interactive map and as a hard copy. Hard copies were deposited at libraries and the Civic Offices alongside the consultation documents. Representations could also be made by letter and email, and the team's contact details were clearly published in the consultation material. An example of the interactive map and response form can be viewed in Appendix 2b.

Land to the East of Martyrs Lane

- 3.12 Following a Council resolution in October 2016, a further round of public consultation was undertaken to consider whether the land to the east of Martyrs Lane should substitute the six safeguarded sites in the Draft Site Allocations DPD, to meet future development needs (beyond the plan period) between 2027-2040. This was a focused consultation and not intended as an opportunity to revisit previous comments or issues raised in the 2015 Draft DPD consultation.
- 3.13 The consultation document 'Land to the east of Martyrs Lane' was published alongside the Sustainability Appraisal assessment of the site, with a link to the updated Sustainability Appraisal Report. On 3 January 2017 the Council sent letters and emails to the specific and general consultation bodies listed in Table 1 and Appendix 1, notifying them of the consultation on Land

to the east of Martyrs Lane was taking place in the period from 6 January to 20 February 2017. The letter and email contained a link to where the consultation documents were available on the Council's LDF website and as hard copies.

- 3.14 Notification about this stage of consultation was sent to organisations and individuals whose details were stored on the Council's LDF Consultation Database, which included those who responded to the Draft DPD (Regulation 18). Respondents were asked not to resubmit previously made comments, and to keep comments relevant to the consultation. The text of the notification letter and email can be found in Appendix 2c.
- 3.15 The consultation documents were made available at the Borough's four libraries, at the Civic offices and electronically on the Council's website. A response form was made available in paper format, available alongside the consultation documents at the locations above, and on the website. The response form can be viewed in Appendix 2c.
- 3.16 The consultation was publicised through various methods, including a press release, social media (Facebook and Twitter), consultation events and drop in sessions, detailed further in the Consultation Statement. The consultation received a high level of interest and numerous articles were published in local newspapers. Copies of these articles can be found in Appendices 45 and 46 of the Consultation Statement.

Regulation 17 (d)(iii) - A summary of the main issues, and (iv) how those have been addressed in the DPD

This section is structured in three parts according to the three separate consultations that were undertaken.

Initial notification

3.17 The Council received comments from specific consultation bodies including Environment Agency, Highways Agency, Natural England, Surrey County Council, Thames Water and English Heritage.

(iii) a summary of the main issues raised by those representations.

- 3.18 A summary of the main issues raised by the representations are:
 - Sites identified for future development should prioritise low flood risk areas. A sequential test should be applied so that development is directed to suitable sites where the risk of flooding is lowest;
 - Consideration should be had for the potential impact on the strategic road network;
 - The assessment of sites should be thorough and criteria based to identify the most sustainable locations and avoid areas that may have a negative impact on sensitive assets in the borough;
 - The preparation of the DPD should be coordinated with infrastructure provision in mind, where there should be continuous consultation with infrastructure providers.
- 3.19 A more comprehensive list of the main issues raised at the stage and how these have been taken into account can be found in Appendix 3a.

(iv) how those main issues have been addressed in the DPD

- 3.20 The points raised emphasised the importance for the Council to undertake a thorough assessment of the potential sites, for constraints, opportunities and development impacts. Engagement at such an early stage allowed for the identification and preparation of further technical work in sufficient time to inform the Draft DPD.
- 3.21 Many of the issues raised were addressed by the Sustainability Appraisal (SA) which has accompanied the DPD at each stage of preparation. The SA demonstrates that a thorough assessment has been undertaken for each of the sites through the evaluation against numerous sustainability objectives including impact on flooding, heritage assets and accessibility.
- 3.22 With regard to the point about the coordination of development with infrastructure provision, the Council has an Infrastructure Delivery Plan (2011, updated 2018), which sets out what infrastructure is required to meet the levels of growth proposed in the Core Strategy, with timings for the provision of such infrastructure. In addition, the Council has continued to consult with infrastructure providers on local infrastructure issues throughout the preparation of the DPD to address any substantial issues.
- 3.23 In addition, each site allocation policy contains key requirements regarding flood risk and flood risk assessments, sustainable urban drainage systems, heritage, transport and access and the necessary assessments. There is also a key requirement for Community Infrastructure Levy towards infrastructure provision, where relevant, and any other form of infrastructure that the site should make provision for. It is important to emphasise that a number of infrastructure projects have already been delivered, and will continue to be delivered to support development.

Draft Site Allocations DPD

(iii) a summary of the main issues raised by those representations.

- 3.24 The Council received responses from 1692 individuals comprising of 32,712 separate representations during this consultation held between 18 June and 31 July 2015. Representations came from various individuals, organisations and groups, including statutory bodies, infrastructure providers, local interest groups and residents. The responses received were processed and published <u>online</u> from the end of 2015
- 3.25 The main issue raised in responses to the consultation was objections to the release of Green Belt for future development. This related to the release of Green Belt to meet development need within the plan period and also to the release of Green Belt for safeguarding, to meet needs beyond 2027. Most people expressed their concern and provided a variety of reasons for their views including infrastructure issues, the environment, wildlife and character of the area.
- 3.26 In addition to the objections to the loss of Green Belt, the most prevalent issues raised in the representations to the Draft (Regulation 18) Site Allocations DPD were:
 - Concerns about local infrastructure and the negative impact new proposals would have- this included comments about local roads, congestion, lack of school provision, lack medical services
 - Objections to the release of Green Belt to meet accommodation needs of Travellers.
 - Concerns about the lack of evidence base. E.g. the lack of a Landscape Character Assessment
 - Concerns regarding the potential significant increase of traffic

- Comments highlighting the various important functions of the GB and why the boundary should be maintained.
- Comments scrutinising the assessments of the sites and highlighting concerns about potential inconsistencies.
- Concerns regarding the identification of safeguarded sites post 2027
- Concerns that sites were at risk of flooding and that increased development sites will increase flooding
- Concerns that there has not been a thorough assessment of alternatives to inform the selection of preferred sites
- Concern that the Council has not demonstrated an exhaustive list of brownfield sites for development
- Site specific comments supporting or objecting various sites
- Proposed reclassification of existing SSSI sites to higher designation
- Suggestions that the Council should re-use existing empty office space, commercial buildings in industrial estates before development in the Green Belt
- Support for more homes in sustainable locations to meet the needs of younger residents who have grown up in the area.
- The Council has deviated from the recommendations of the Green Belt Boundary Review and have proposed to allocate sites that have not been recommended in the report
- Concerns that proposals would irreversibly alter the character of the area
- Concern that there is a lack of joined up work between Woking Borough Council and Surrey County Council.
- 3.27 The Council prepared a separate document containing its response to some of the key issues that were raised by the representations entitled 'Response to key issues and matters submitted during the Regulation 18 consultation' (see Appendix 3b). Whilst the topic paper addressed the key issues raised, it did not deal with all individual representations made. Therefore, for completeness, the Council carefully considered and provided individual responses to each of the 32,712 separate representations. These can be viewed at https://www.woking2027.info/allocations and in hard copy at the Civic Offices.
- 3.28 Other representations raised issues that did not attract receive the same level of response. These concentrated on locally specific issues, suggestions of new sites or amendments to existing ones, and comments relating to wider environmental or housing issues, including:
 - Scrutiny over the travel times set out in the document- considered unrealistic
 - Objection to certain sites and reasons why said sites were not considered developable, deliverable
 - Suggestions of new sites for inclusion in the DPD or provision of further supporting information for sites already in the DPD (see paragraph 3.39 below)
 - Concerns regarding conditions of roads/pavements and the impact these have
 - The impact of development proposals on wildlife has not been assessed
 - The proportion of Green Belt areas within a certain area of the Borough that would be lost as a result of development proposals
 - Further consideration should be given to downsizing and elderly people accommodation.

(iv) how those main issues have been addressed in the DPD

- 3.29 The responses resulted in a number of updates of detailed nature to bring the DPD up to date. The planning status of the sites were either updated or sites were deleted altogether (where permissions were either implemented or being implemented- e.g. Victoria Square and Former St Dunstans). This was particularly important where changes had an impact on the anticipated use or capacity of the sites, these modifications were proposed for the following sites:
 - Nursery land adjacent to Egley Road, Mayford. Allocated for residential development and a school. Planning permission was granted for a school. *Planning status to be updated*
 - Horsell Moor, Allocated for residential development. Planning permission was granted for elderly accommodation. *Proposed use to include elderly accommodation*
 - Broadoaks, Allocated for employment led mixed use development including offices and residential. Planning permission was granted for a secondary school and 155 dwellings. *Proposed use to include educational facilities.*
 - Elliot Court. Allocated for mixed use development to include residential and offices. Planning permission was granted for residential on part of the site
 - Coal Yard/Aggregates Yard, Guildford Road. Allocated for residential. The allocation was dependent on the relocation of existing uses and therefore modifications were proposed for this site.
 - 30-32 Goldsworth Road, Woking Railway and Athletic Club, Systems House and Bridge house. Allocated for mixed use. Pre-application discussions suggest a higher capacity could be supported. *The details on capacity were updated to reflect the emerging scheme.*
 - Albion House, High Street and Commercial Way. Works in this area suggest the inclusion and capacity of the sites should be altered.
 - Land at Five Acres, the Council has acquired the land to deliver residential, including accommodation for traveller pitches. The sites should be combined and proposed uses amended to include affordable housing and accommodation needs for travellers.
 - Ten Acre. It was proposed that the uses be extended to include green infrastructure, recreation and parking
- 3.30 Some representations put forward new sites or provided further supporting information. These included:
 - Supporting information for residential development at Pyrford sites (GB12/13)
 - Land at Brookwood Cemetery for cemetery and crematorium provision
 - Byfleet Cricket Club and Playing Field for residential development
 - Land to east of Egley Road for residential development
 - Open land at Blackmore Crescent, Sheerwater for residential development
 - Pyrford Cricket Ground and Village Hall for residential development
 - Land at Tulip Trees, near Ascan Croft, St Johns for residential development
 - Woking Football Club of mixed use development including residential
 - West Byfleet Railway Station Car Park for residential development.
- 3.31 These sites were assessed further and a sustainability appraisal carried out in line with the Sustainability Appraisal Framework. Two of the sites proposed were taken forward:
 - Land at Brookwood Cemetery for cemetery, crematorium and other forms of disposal, conservation and enhancement of the heritage assets of the sites, creation of visitor facilities and museum and display space to explain all matters related to death and operational facilities such a secure storage. The site will continue to be washed over by the Green Belt.

- Land at Woking Football Club, Kingfield Road, Kingfield to be allocated for mixed use development including Gymnastic Club.
- 3.32 Aside from the above modifications and minor editorial updates, no significant modifications were proposed. The full responses were <u>published</u> online on 9 November 2016 and were also available for inspection at the Civic Centre on request. Any proposed modifications as a result of representations were clearly stated where relevant. A revised draft Site Allocation DPD was taken to the LDF Working Group in July 2016.

Land to the East of Martyrs Lane

(iii) a summary of the main issues raised by those representations.

- 3.33 As noted above, this was a focused consultation to consider whether the land to the east of Martyrs Lane should substitute the six safeguarded sites in the Draft Site Allocations DPD, to meet future development needs between 2027-2040. It was not intended as an opportunity to revisit previous comments or issues raised in the 2015 Draft DPD (Regulation 18) consultation.
- 3.34 Following further work and bespoke consultation carried out on Land to the East of Martyrs Lane (as detailed below), in accordance with the resolution of the Council, the revised draft Site Allocation DPD was then taken to the LDF working group on 5 September 2018, for agreement to proceed to Council to approve publication and consultation of the Draft (Regulation 19) Site Allocations DPD.
- 3.35 The Council received 32,164 representations from 3,018 individuals and organisations. The majority (81%) of responses objected to the possibility of safeguarding the land east of Martyrs Lane. 550 responses (18.2%) supported the proposal with the view that one large site would allow for economies of scale, where the necessary infrastructure could be delivered more easily for the one site. The remaining responses were neither for or against. Comments received were wide ranging, and presented issues such as increased traffic, insufficient infrastructure and the impact on the environment as reasons for objecting to the proposal.
- 3.36 Further detail of the main comments received from the consultation included:
 - Concern that development of land east of Martyrs Lane would lead to urban sprawl.
 - Concerns of the risk of flooding, parts of the site is within Floodzone 2 and 3
 - Concern that the Martyrs Lane proposal will concentrate traffic in one area and therefore have a negative impact on residents and businesses in the immediate area. The previously identified safeguarded sites would allow for traffic to be dispersed.
 - Concern that there is a lack of public transport connectivity in and around the site
 - Concerns about sink holes in the area around Martyrs Lane
 - The proposal would lead to unsustainable development
 - The scale of development will require major infrastructure
 - Concerns about the impact on habitats and wildlife
 - Concern that there are no special circumstances to justify the release of the site from the Green Belt
 - Ancient woodlands should be protected, concerns raised that the Ancient Woodland on the site will be negatively affected
 - Concern that proposals don't take into account development proposals in adjoining authorities e.g Fairoaks
 - Criticism of the existing transport policy
 - The site is not suitable because it is under a number of flightpaths
 - Concerns about the social and environmental reasons for not living near a recycling centre

- Objection to urban extension approach as an alternative to a dispersed approach to deliver future development needs post 2027
- Concerns about the makeup of members on the LDF Working Group
- Questions about the deliverability of the site given that the owners have confirmed that the land is not available for development.
- Concerns that the site is contrary to the Council's Natural Woking Strategy and Landscape Assessment.
- Concerns that the Canalside Ward will be the focus of most of the development for the borough
- Support for the redevelopment of Martyrs Lane over the original six sites as the site consist pre-developed, underused land
- Reference to the Officer's Report for the McLaren proposal which suggests that the proposal site wouldn't lead to urban sprawl
- The Martyrs Lane site can be developed to achieve the Council's objectives without the need to develop the Golf Course
- Reference to the Green Belt Boundary Review Report, which states Parcel 9 has 'very low suitability' for removal from the Green Belt.
- The Pyrford and Mayford Green Belt is an irreplaceable asset and has conservation areas and heritage assets adjacent
- One large site at Martyrs Lane will provide economies of scale making it easier to resolve infrastructure issues and allow for new facilities to be built on site.
- The Martyrs Lane site is easily accessible from the M25, Woking Town Centre and the arterial road networks.
- There is no published evidence to support the safeguarding of land to the east of Martyrs Lane
- The Martyrs Lane consultation is not supported by additional transport assessment to identify potential traffic impacts on the local and strategic road network including A245 and A318
- Confusion raised as to why the Martyrs Lane site which was previously considered unsuitable for development can now be identified for potential future development
- 3.37 The Council also received representations from two significant land owners of the site (New Zealand Golf Club and the McLaren Technologies Group Ltd). The former confirmed that the golf course was not currently available and would not be so in future, and McLaren stated that it would only allow its land holding to be used as a strategic employment site to support its own future expansion. In this regard, these two sites were not considered available to meet future development need and are unlikely to be considered deliverable or developable with regard to the NPPF. It was considered unlikely that a compulsory purchase application would be successful. Therefore, safeguarding the sites regardless could undermine the soundness of the DPD.
- 3.38 The exclusion of the two land holdings from the land east of Martyrs Lane would result in a significantly smaller development area and lower capacity to accommodate future development needs at the level required to substitute all the previously identified sites. In addition to this, the residual area excluding the two areas will lead to isolated development within the Green Belt and therefore lead to urban sprawl.
- 3.39 Officers summarised and considered all representations and provided a response to each, and any proposed modifications as a result of the representation was clearly stated. The full responses can be viewed at <u>https://www.woking2027.info/allocations/repsresponsemartlane</u>. Hard copies of the representations can also be inspected at Woking's Civic Centre on request.

3.40 In addition to this, the Council prepared two topic papers which sought to address recurring issues submitted in the representations (see Appendix 3c for weblinks). The title of the first paper was entitled 'Woodham and Horsell Neighbourhood Forum, Issues and Response Topic Paper' and was prepared in order to address standard comments prepared by Woodham and Horsell Neighbourhood Forum. The form comprised of 15 distinct representations objecting to the land east of Martyrs Lane site and formed the basis, either in part or full, to the vast majority of the responses to the consultation. The second topic paper, the 'Duty to Cooperate Bodies Topic Paper' was in response to representations submitted by statutory consultees and neighbouring authorities.

(iv) how those main issues have been addressed in the DPD

3.41 Based on the analysis of representations received during Regulation 18, as summarised above, and the available evidence, including the Green Belt Boundary Review 2014, the Green Belt Review and Landscape Assessment for land to the east of Martyrs Lane 2016, A320 Corridor Study, Woking Town Centre Modelling Assessment, HRA, a review of the Infrastructure Delivery Plan, the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment and the Sustainability Appraisal, Officers took a report to the LDF Working Group on 5 September 2018. This recommended that the original safeguarded sites published in June-July 2015, with the exception of GB13 Land east of Upshot Lane be taken forward as the Council's preferred approach to safeguarding for the purposes of the Regulation 19 consultation. It also included the modifications proposed as a result of that Regulation 18 consultation (June-July 2015), as originally presented to the working group in July 2016.

4. Conclusion

- 4.1 This statement has set out how the Council has met the requirements of Regulation 17(d) as reiterated in Regulation 22 (1)(c). It shows which bodies and persons were invited to make representations under Regulation 18, and how they were invited to do so, giving details of how the requirements have been met at each stage of consultation undertaken under Regulation 18, as detailed in Section 2. It goes on to summarise the main issues raised by the representations within each stage of the Regulation 18 consultations, and how those main issues have been addressed in the DPD.
- 4.2 In addition to the specific requirements of this statement, comprehensive consultation has been carried out throughout the preparation of the Site Allocations DPD, meeting or exceeding the requirements of the relevant Regulations and the Council's Statement of Community Involvement (2015). Extensive detail of this can be found in the Council's Consultation Statement, which meets the requirements of Regulation 22(1)(c), and is submitted to the Secretary of State alongside this Statement and the Submission Draft DPD. For information, it is emphasised that representations received during the Regulation 19 consultation, analysis of those representations and the Council's Schedule of Proposed Modifications have been submitted to the Secretary of State as part of the Submission Documents.

I would like to notify you that Woking Borough Council is about to begin the process of preparing the following Local Development Documents:

Site Allocations DPD – this document will allocate specific sites for the delivery of all forms of development, including residential, commercial and retail development. Where relevant, it will also safeguard land for the delivery of infrastructure. The programme for the preparation of this DPD is set in the Council's adopted Local Development Scheme (LDS). The LDS is on the Council's website (www.woking.gov.uk/planning/policy/ldf/LDS2).

Development Management Policies DPD – it will set specific detailed policies for the management of development and the use of land. The programme for the preparation of this DPD is set out in the LDS. It should be emphasised that the Core Strategy will provide the policy framework for determining the suitability of a significant number of development proposals that will come forward. Consequently, this DPD will concentrate on policies where detailed guidance is necessary to guide the management of development.

Supplementary Planning Document for design: it will provide detailed design guide to ensure that development enhances the distinctive character of the area without constraining creativity and innovation. It will include guidance to manage the development of hot food takeaways and other such uses.

Supplementary Planning Document for affordable housing: It will provide detailed clarification of the requirements of the affordable housing policy of the Core Strategy (Policy CS12: Affordable Housing) and how it will apply. For example, how affordable housing could be secured on the back of commercial development.

Supplementary Planning Document for sustainable construction and renewable energy: it will set out detailed guidance for the application of the sustainable construction and renewable energy policies of the Core Strategy (Policies CS22: Sustainable construction and CS23: Renewable and low carbon energy generation). Examples of what the SPD might include are the zones within which new development will be required to connect to a CHP station or district heating network and details of the allowable solutions framework and the Council's carbon offset fund.

Supplementary Planning Document for Thames Basin Heaths Special Protection Areas Avoidance Strategy: it will provide detailed guidance for the protection and enhancement of the Thames Basin Heaths Special Protection Area.

Community Infrastructure Levy: it will set out a Charging Schedule, a funding gap and differential rates to be levied on development to secure contributions toward the delivery of local infrastructure to support development.

Review of the car and cycle parking standards: the review will seek to bring the existing standards up to date to reflect current residential and business needs as well as national planning policy on parking.

Before the Council begin the preparation of the documents, I would like to seek your views about the broad issues/topics that you would like the documents to cover. This will enable the Council to take that into account from the beginning of the process.

The Council has a project plan with specific timescales for the preparation of these documents. In this regard, I will appreciate it if you can respond to this request by 29 June 2012. I will ensure that you are involved in all the key stages during the preparation of the documents.



However, to ensure coordination of water supply and waste water infrastructure, the Council has added a key requirement to ensure that Thames Water is consulted in the Development Management process, with regard to water supply, waste water capacity and surface water drainage at specific sites, where relevant.
