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#### Introduction

National planning policy attaches significant importance to getting the Core Strategy right. This is reflected in the fact that it is subject to an Independent Examination. The Core Strategy has the potential to impact on the lives of people who live, work and visit the Borough. It is therefore vital that it is the most appropriate strategy for the area. This is a key reason why there is an Independent Examination to provide that assurance. The Examination will primarily be concerned with legal compliance and soundness.

Planning Policy Statement (PPS) 12, paragraph 4.49 specifies that the starting point for the Examination is the assumption that the Local Planning Authority has submitted what it considers to be a sound plan. Paragraph 4.50 - 4.52 of PPS12 defines what constitutes legal requirements and soundness.

#### Legal requirements

Under the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 S 20(5)(a) an Inspector is charged with firstly checking that the plan has complied with legislation. This includes checking that the plan:

- has been prepared in accordance with the Local Development Scheme and in compliance with the Statement of Community Involvement and the Regulations;
- has been subject to sustainability appraisal;
- has regard to national policy;
- conforms generally to the Regional Spatial Strategy; and
- has regard to any sustainable community strategy for its area (i.e. county and district).

#### Soundness

Section 20(5)(b) of the Act requires the Inspector to determine whether the plan is sound. To be sound a Core Strategy should be **justified**, **effective** and consistent with **national policy**.

Justified means the document must be:

- found on a robust and credible evidence base.
- The most appropriate strategy when considered against the reasonable alternatives.

Effective means that the document must be:

- deliverable.
- Flexible.
- Able to be monitored.

The Council has carried out a self assessment of how the preparation and contents of the Core Strategy Publication Document meets both the legal requirements and the tests of soundness. It has done so using the Planning Advisory Service well established soundness tool. Appendices 1 and 2 are assessment of how the Core Strategy Publication Document meets the tests of soundness and the legal requirements respectively. Reference has been made to a number of evidence base documents throughout assessments. A list of the documents with links to the website is included in Appendix 3.
